Blue Cards – Ministry Agents (no stipend)			

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Roles Details:

- Volunteer (e.g. lay pastor or lay preacher).
- Employee (paid a wage not a stipend).
- Retired Ministry Agents not available for supply, but active in Congregation or considered a Religious Representative in the community.

Blue Card Details:

- Must hold a Blue Card.
- Link Blue Card to every organisation you work or volunteer.
- New applications: list Presbytery Chair as contact person in 'organisation's contact person' section.

Blue Cards - Ministry Agents (stipend)

Role Details:

- Covenantal relationship.
- Receive a stipend.
- Available for supply or placement.

Determined as 'conducting your own regulated business as a religious representative' due to the Covenantal relationship.

Blue Card Details:

- Must hold a Business Blue Card.
- Link Card to **Synod** and every organisation connected to.
- Complete 'consent to discuss information' form.
- New applications: list General Secretary as contact person in 'organisation's contact person' section.





Shared Guardianship

All people, including children, are made in the image of God.

As a Christian community we believe that God reaches out to us in love and acceptance, and that our relationships with each other should express love, care and respect.

- Positive, respectful culture in which everyone plays an important role.
- Support everyone to foster a safe and nurturing environment where everyone can flourish.

Abuse = Action

- Physical

Harm = Impact

Physical Abuse

Non-accidental use of physical force against another individual which results in harm (Whether harm is intended or not).

Emotional Abuse

Pattern of behaviour that intentionally undermines, manipulates, or controls another person's emotions, thoughts, beliefs or actions.

Neglect

Failure by a parent or caregiver to provide a young or vulnerable person with the conditions that are culturally accepted in a society as being essential for physical and emotional development and wellbeing.

Financial Abuse

Domestic or interpersonal abuse where one individual exerts control over another person's financial resources, assets, debts, or financial decision-making to gain power and control over them.

Sexual Abuse

Unwanted or non-consensual activity or behaviour that is forced upon an individual against their will or without consent.

Social Abuse

Deliberate act of isolating an individual or group of individuals from social interactions and relationships as a form of mistreatment or harm.

Spiritual Abuse

Misuse or manipulation of religious or spiritual beliefs, practices, or teachings to control, manipulate, or harm individuals or groups.

Domestic and Family Violence

A family member, partner or ex-partner, or other household member attempts to physically or psychologically dominate the other.

Indicators of Sexual Abuse

- Frequent, recurring nightmares, bedwetting or soiling clothing.
- Unexplained injury to sexual body parts.
- Hints about sexual activity or sexual knowledge beyond child's age or developmental stage.
- Overly sexualized behaviour / play / themes in artwork.
- Refusing to talk about 'secrets'
- Unexplained gifts or money
- Recurring themes of power / control in play
- Sudden behavioural shifts

Grooming

- Deliberate actions with aim of befriending and establishing an emotional connection.
- Used to lower inhibitions in preparation for sexual activity.
- Is a criminal offence in Queensland.

Possible indicators (but not automatically grooming):

- Fear, dislike, discomfort or reluctance around a particular adult.
- Repeated unacceptable behaviours.
- Frequent, vague or implausible health complaints.
- Unexplained gifts, particularly of high value.
- Displaying harmful or problematic sexual behaviour.





Grooming – Stages and Strategies

- 1. **Identify the target** (most vulnerable/receptive person or families).
- 2. **Gain trust** (be indispensable or significant).
- 3. **Fill a need** (give the individual special status e.g. preferential treatment, sharing secrets, gifts).
- 4. **Isolate the target** (physical or emotional).
- Relationship is sexualised (strategies used to desensitise person to sexual touch). At this point, criminal sexual abuse and exploitation are occurring.
- 6. **Maintain control** (blame, threats, bribes).

Disclosure variables - Children

- Four variables denial, recantation, reaffirmation, timing.
- A child has chosen who they will disclose to, and what they will disclose to them.
- Children are less likely to purposefully disclose they are being abused.
- Disclosure can be a process, not necessarily an event.
- Body language and words chosen when responding to disclosures have a profound and lasting impact.

Responding to Disclosure (Ministry Agent) – R.E.S.P.O.N.D

R	Reassure	 Reassure the person – welcome the information and reaffirm they are doing the right thing by speaking up. Listen calmly, patiently, and supportively. Let the person or child use their own words. Tell them what happened to them is not their own fault.
E	Ensure immediate danger is addressed	 Ensure immediate danger is addressed and call 000 if there is imminent danger. Gently ask questions to assess, if not mentioned outright, however do not investigate officially. Address concerns about their safety.
S	Statement	 Make an internal report using the Speak Up! QR code or link. Take comprehensive notes. Record to whom you have reported your concerns (internally and externally). Do not investigate the situation.
P	Plan	 Plan your next actions. Complete the reporting threshold tests in Mandatory Reporting for Ministry Agents (appropriate actions, external reporting level).
0	Obligation to report	 You have Mandatory obligations to report under state legislation and Church policy. Report internally, and if necessary externally to Queensland Police Service and/or Queensland Child Protection Authorities.
N	Needs for assistance or referral	 Offer support and referrals specific to their needs, using the Reporting and Referral Guide. What does the person need to feel safe and be involved in the process? What Pastoral Care is offered to the survivor? What Pastoral Care is offered to the accused person (if within Church)?
D	Debrief	 Assist debriefing leaders/volunteers. Debrief with trusted colleague or Presbytery Minister. Maintain confidentiality. Prioritise self-care.





Responding to Disclosure (Lay People) – B.C.A.L.M

В	Breathe	Use a quick calming technique and suggest the person 'take a deep breath'.
С	Calm the Person Stay focused on them and their story. Use words like "You've done the right thing by telling me" and "I believe you".	
Α	Assess immediate danger	If life-threatening, call 000. Gently ask questions to assess if they are in danger.
L	Let them know your obligations	Manage expectations by identifying the steps that will occur, including obligation to report.
M	Make a report	Lay people are encouraged to report to their Ministry Agent or use internal reporting QR code/link.

Helping Survivors	Mandatory Reporting
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- People reach out to the church in times of need and vulnerability.
- People should be greeted with support and acceptance – leaves a lasting impact on their lives.
- Do everything in our power to minimise trauma.
- Make appropriate referrals for supportive therapies to promote resilience.
- suspicions of abuse, neglect, grooming, domestic or family violence.


External reporting required for actual or reasonable

- Maintain the care and safety of people as priority.
- Wondering "What if I am wrong?" is valid and possible, but "What if I'm right?" and you fail to make a report due to your reservations?
- External agencies are equipped to investigate and decide if person is harmed and resulting actions.

Bystander Effect

- Failure of a group of witnesses to respond to abuse.
- It is important to take every report seriously.
